Echinacea pallida 'Hula Dancer' Hula Dancer Pale Purple Coneflower

Echinacea pallida 'Hula Dancer' (Hula Dancer Pale Purple Coneflower) is a 4-season perennial with drooping slender, light-pink petals that circle a robust yellowish-red central cone, resembling the draped, swaying skirt of a hula dancer. At 2-3' tall, the flowers sit atop unbranched stiff grayish or reddish green stems. Most of the narrow, lanceolate leaves are basal, with parallel veins and an olive green color. Unlike other Echinacea, this species has long (up to 9"), narrow leaves that are un-toothed, altogether making this a more slender perennial in every aspect. Stems and leaves are slightly hairy, adding a soft texture to the garden. This hardy prairie flower is adapted for full sun, and can tolerate part shade, heat, drought, and poor infertile soils of clay or gravel. It does best in dry to medium, fertile soils. It's recommended to leave the attractive dark gray seed heads, as they provide architectural interest in the winter, as well as a food source for finches and other birds. This plant is resistant to many herbivores, including deer, and is well-adapted to exist within a prescribed burn regime in a prairie-inspired landscape.
